As a church, we are celebrating this Sunday as Women's Sunday where we will recognize the many contributions of the women in our congregation and look to the scripture for empowerment.

### March 17, 2024

"The Seed Must Die" (John 12:20-33)

Jesus speaks about His impending death and the principle that life comes through death, a seed falling into the ground.

## March 24, 2024 Palm Sunday

"Jesus on Parade" (Mark 11:1-11) Jesus enters Jerusalem as a king, but not the kind of king the people expected. His kingdom is one of peace and humility.

## March 28, 2024 Maundy Thursday

"On Meals and Memories" (John 13:1-17, 31b-35) Jesus washes the disciples' feet and gives a new commandment to love one another.

## March 29, 2024 Good Friday

"Disciples in the Darkness" (John 18:1- 19:42) The narrative of Jesus' betrayal, trial, crucifixion, and death.

## March 31, 2024 Easter Sunday - Sunrise and Morning

"Only the Beginning" (Mark 16:1-8, John 20:1-8) The discovery of the empty tomb by the women and the angelic message that Jesus has risen.

# From the Desk of Pastor Jonathan



Dear Beloved in Christ,

As the season of Lent unfolds, it invites us into a sacred space of reflection and communion with our Savior. The Apostle Paul writes in Galatians 2:20, "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me." This profound truth reminds us that the journey of Lent is not simply a tradition, but a transformative experience – one that calls us to look to the power of the cross and the transformative good news of Jesus Christ.

Lent beckons us to engage more deeply with our spiritual disciplines. It is a time when we realign our hearts with the heart of God, echoing the psalmist's plea: "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me" (Psalm 51:10). As we fast, whether from food, certain activities, or patterns of thought, we echo the sacrifice of Christ, who "emptied Himself" (Philippians 2:7) for our sake.

C.S. Lewis, in "Mere Christianity," beautifully articulates the call to spiritual discipline: "The moment you wake up each morning... all your wishes and hopes for the day rush at you like wild animals. And the first job each morning consists of shoving them all back; in listening to that other voice, taking that other point of view, letting that other, larger, stronger, quieter life come flowing in."

Prayer, too, is a cornerstone of our Lenten practice. It serves as the lifeline between us and the Divine. In the stillness of our conversations with God, we find strength and sustenance. Martin Luther, a figure central to the Protestant Reformation, once said, "To be a Christian without prayer is no more possible than to be alive without breathing." May we breathe deeply of this spiritual practice, finding solace and guidance in our daily walk.

Almsgiving is an expression of love that extends beyond words. It is faith in action, as James reminds us that "faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead" (James 2:17). This Lent, let us consider how we might be the hands and feet of Jesus, serving those in need and reflecting His light in the darkest corners of our communities.

As we observe these disciplines, let us remember that they are not ends in themselves but means to draw us closer to the heart of God. They are tools that help us to carry our cross daily and to follow Jesus (Luke 9:23). The power of the cross is not found in the wood or the nails, but in the infinite love of the One who was willing to suffer on it for our redemption.

And so, dear brothers and sisters, let us press on in our Lenten practices, not as a show of piety, but as a sincere offering of ourselves. Let the words of the old hymn be our prayer: "Beneath the cross of Jesus, my unworthy soul is won."

May we journey through this Lent with eyes fixed on the cross, where we find the ultimate display of love and sacrifice. And let us look forward to the dawn of Easter, where the power of the resurrection promises new life and hope for us all.



## FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR JULIE


Youth Fun Stuff

exciting journey where will we learn to trust God no matter what situation life brings, know God is always with us, and feel confident in sharing the good news of God's love through Jesus Christ.




