




August 6: Greater than our Needs (Matthew 14:13-21) Title: "Satisfied in Scarcity"

In the story of Jesus feeding the five thousand, there was a seemingly impossible situation with limited resources, but Jesus demonstrated that He is greater than our needs. Through this miracle, we'll learn to trust in His abundant provision and find satisfaction even in times of scarcity.

August 13: Greater than our Fears (Matthew 14:22-33) Title: "Walking on Water"

The account of Jesus walking on water shows His supremacy over the storms that cause fear in our lives. By focusing on Peter's experience, we'll learn how Jesus is greater than our fears and doubts. As we step out in faith and keep our eyes fixed on Him, we can overcome the raging waves that seek to overwhelm us.

August 20: Greater than our Traditions (Matthew 15:10-28) Title: "Breaking Boundaries"

Jesus confronts the Pharisees and scribes over their strict adherence to traditions. He shows us that He is greater than empty rituals and legalism. We'll explore how He embraces diversity and breaks cultural barriers to demonstrate that faith and love transcend man-made rules.

August 27: Greater than our Confession (Matthew 16:13-20) Title: "The Rock of Revelation"

Peter confesses Jesus as the Messiah, and Jesus' declares that He will build His church upon this revelation. This passage reveals that Jesus is greater than our understanding, and His divine authority is the foundation of our faith. We'll explore how recognizing Jesus' true identity transforms our lives and empowers us to be witnesses of His greatness.

In this sermon series, we will discover that Jesus is greater than every aspect of our lives -"greater than our needs, fears, traditions, and even our own confessions. By fixing our eyes on Him and recognizing His supremacy, we can find true satisfaction, peace, and purpose in every circumstance. May this series strengthen our faith, deepen our relationship with Christ, and equip us to live as bold and faithful followers of the One who is truly Greater Than all.


