Encounters with Christ: A Tourney Through Mark

Sermon Series - February 2024

February's sermon series will take us through a sequential journey in the Gospel of Mark. We will explore four distinct narratives where Jesus encounters individuals in need, displaying His power to heal, restore, and transform lives. Each week, we will seek to understand the deeper spiritual implications of these encounters and apply Jesus' teachings to our modern lives.

February 4, 2024

"Healing at Hand: Restoring the Sabbath" (Mark 1:29-39

Jesus heals Simon's mother-in-law and many others, emphasizing the restoration that comes with the Kingdom of God.

We'll explore the significance of healing on the Sabbath and what it means to find rest in Christ. The sermon will challenge us to seek spiritual restoration in Jesus and to become agents of restoration in our communities.

February 11, 2024

"The Touch of Transformation: Embracing the Outcast" (Mark 1:40-45)

Jesus heals a man with leprosy, demonstrating His willingness to touch and restore those who are marginalized.

This message will delve into the themes of compassion, social stigma, and the transformative power of Christ's touch. We'll consider how we can follow Jesus' example in reaching out to those who feel excluded or unlovable.

February 18, 2024

"Faith That Breaks Barriers: The Paralytic's Plight" (Mark 2:1-12)

Four friends lower a paralyzed man through a roof to get to Jesus, showing the lengths to which faith will go for healing.

The sermon will highlight the importance of community in the journey of faith and the barriers that we must overcome to bring others to Christ. We'll be encouraged to consider what 'roofs' we need to dismantle in our efforts to help others encounter Jesus.

February 25, 2024

"New Wine into New Wineskins: The Call for Renewal" (Mark 2:13-22)

Jesus calls Levi, eats with sinners, and teaches about the incompatibility of new wine in old wineskins. This talk will address the radical inclusivity of Jesus' call and the new way of life He inaugurates, which cannot be contained within old structures. We'll discuss the need for personal and corporate renewal in the church to fully embrace and live out the gospel.

Each sermon will offer practical steps for application and opportunities for the congregation to respond, whether through prayer, reflection, service, or community engagement. The series aims to deepen our understanding of Jesus's ministry in Mark's Gospel and inspire us to live out our faith with boldness and compassion.

Week 1: Ash Wednesday -February 14- Pastor Jonathan Bangera

Title: Dust to Dust: Humility and the Human Condition

Scripture: Psalm 51:17; Matthew 5:3--4

Theme: Recognizing our frailty and need for a Savior.

Focus: As we receive the ashes, we are reminded of our mortality and our need for humility in seeking justice. We will explore how understanding our human condition under the shadow of the cross can inspire us to act justly towards one another.

Week 2 - February 21 - Pastor Steve Barrett, Bethany Church, Columbia

Title: The Weight of the Wait: Patience in Pursuit of Promise

Scripture: James 5:7--8; Luke 2:25--32

Waiting on God's timing in a world that demands instant solutions.

In a society that often seeks quick fixes, the cross challenges us to patient advocacy and long-term commitment to justice. We'll discuss how to faithfully serve and wait in a world of injustice, without losing hope.

Week 3- February 28 Pastor Julie Kies, Interim Associate Minister

Title: Voices from the Margins: Listening to the Silenced

Scripture: Proverbs 31:8--9; Luke 4:18--19

Giving voice to those who are marginalized as Jesus did.

The message of the cross is also a call to justice. We will examine how to listen and respond to the marginalized in our society, following Jesus' example of uplifting the downtrodden.

Week 4 - March 6- Pastor Jonathan Bangera

Title: Restorative Righteousness: The Justice of the Cross

Scripture: Isaiah 53:5--6; Romans 3:25--26

Understanding how the cross brings both mercy and justice together.

We will delve into the concept of restorative justice as demonstrated on the cross and discuss how we can be agents of restorative righteousness in a broken world.

Week 5- March 13 -Pastor Todd Mushaney, Christ UCC Dupo

Title: The Currency of Compassion: Investing in Others

Scripture: 2 Corinthians 8:9; Matthew 19:16--22

Generosity as an act of worship and a reflection of Christ's sacrifice.

We will look at how the cross compels us to examine how we view our investments of time, resources, and compassion. The only way we can truly exemplify Christ's love is by surrendering our insecurities to him.

Week 6- March 20 -Pastor Matt Friz, St. Paul UCC Floraville

Title: Forgiven to Forgive: The Economy of Grace

Scripture: Colossians 3:13; Matthew 18:21--22

Embracing and extending forgiveness as we reflect on Jesus' forgiveness from the cross.

The cross is the ultimate symbol of forgiveness. We'll explore how receiving grace empowers us to offer forgiveness, even within the complex arena of social justice, and how this can lead to healing and reconciliation.

Week 7: Holy Week March 27 -Pastor Jonathan Bangera

Title: The Triumph of Tragedy: Hope Beyond the Grave

Scripture: 1 Corinthians 15:54--57; John 16:33

The hope and promise of the resurrection amidst the pain and suffering of the world.

As we approach the culmination of Lent, we will reflect on the tragedy of the cross and the triumph of the empty tomb, finding hope in Jesus' victory over death and injustice


When thinking of the health focus of February, the color **RED** comes to mind! This is Heart Health month and knowing how we should prepare ourselves in numerous ways in keeping the heart healthy.

Red is also the color seen when donating blood to the RED CROSS, hospitals, etc. The American Red Cross is experiencing an emergency blood shortage as the nation faces the lowest number of people giving blood in 20 years. Blood is needed for lifesaving medical procedures, cancer patients when treatment affects the blood, sickle cell anemia patients, regular surgeries, etc. Blood banks say the number of people donating blood dropped sharply during and after the pandemic as people working from home stopped participating in office blood drives. Anyone age 17 years old and up are able to donate every 56 days. There is no upper age limit. If diabetic, and have trouble controlling blood sugar, then need to wait. You can schedule a donor appointment with the Red Cross at 1-800-RED-CROSS, or through RedCrossBlood.org. Columbia has sites at Turners, Immaculate Conception School at various times of the year.

Red is also the color we associate with Valentine's Day to express our love and affection for our loved ones. The Bible does not have any specific message about the holiday since the dates back to the 14th century, but it does have a lot to say about love!

Dear friends: let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love. So with this Bible verse, let us love ourselves by taking care of our health and love one another by taking a small step of blood donation in helping in their health needs


