1. October 1, 2023

2. October 8, 2023

"Journey into Accountability: The Fruit of Faithfulness"

Matthew 21:33-46

Week 2 leads us to explore what it means to bear the fruit of faithfulness in our lives.

3. October 15, 2023

"Journey into Invitation: God's Eternal Feast"

Matthew 22:1-14

Week 3 invites us on where we'll discover God's eternal feast and ponder whom we might have forgotten to invite to the table.

4. October 22, 2023

"Journey into Allegiance: God and Government"

Matthew 22:15-22

Week 4 navigates a delicate exploration into the tensions between God and government, and the question of where our ultimate loyalty lies.

5. October 29, 2023

"Journey into Love: The Foundation of All Law"

Matthew 29:34-46

And finally, Week 5 takes us into the very core of all spiritual voyages where we'll look at the bedrock principle that underpins all of Jesus' teachings—the commandment to love God and neighbor. A Journey Together

I invite you to journey with us, bringing your questions, your doubts, your insights, and your faith. Whether you are new to the path of faith or have been walking it for years, there's something in this series for everyone. It's not a journey we take alone; we go together, as a community and as part of the greater body of Christ.

So pack your proverbial bags, fasten your seatbelts, and let us begin these Journeys to the Heart of Faith. May our hearts and minds be open, and may we find that our faith has grown stronger, our vision clearer, and our love deeper through this adventure. Amen.

HEALTHIER TOGETHER—GET YOUR FLU VACCINE!
THE FLU SHOT----JUST NOT FOR OLD PEOPLE!
COVID-19 UPDATED BOOSTER AVAILABLE

It is that time of year when the flu shots are coming around for everyone 6 months are older! Make a family outing to get the needed vaccines. Updated COVID-19 Boosters are now available at most pharmacies for the new detected strain of Pirola. Thankfully, we are at a different place with COVID-19 than we were at the beginning of the pandemic, but COVID-19 is here to stay in different variants, and we can help ourselves and each other by taking precautions! New this year for adults 60 plus is a vaccine for RSV or respiratory syncytial virus which can cause as much illness as influenza. Though the COVID-19 and flu vaccines can be taken together, experts advise getting the RSV shot separately. Under the Affordable Care Act, all insurance companies are required to cover vaccines that are recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices, including the updated COVID-19 vaccines. Uninsured or underinsured can get their vaccine through the Bridge Access Program.

If you feel ill on a Sunday morning, please watch the church service online! If you are not comfortable Passing the Peace with another by touching, give them a wave! Please feel comfortable in wearing a mask to church as you will be respected by others.

While volunteering at the Monroe County Fairgrounds to help with the first COVID-19 shots as people drove their cars in line around the fairgrounds, I had a man in his car ask me, "What would God think of using these shots?" At the time, I knew with my medical background that God would be pleased a medication was found for this disease just as when Penicillin was found and I probably made such a comparison to him. Since I always like to include a Bible verse according to the monthly subject for the Parish Nurse article, I found the following that I did not have on the tip of my tongue that day!

Matthew 10:26 But Jesus looked at them and said, "With man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible."

GETTING OUR YOUTH INVOLVED... ENCOURAGING OUR YOUNG PEOPLE TO BE A PART OF CHURCH



Church is a time of holiness, an opportunity to gain experience in our understanding of God's love for us and his desires for our lives. Youth can experience and appreciate this if given the opportunity. Youth of all ages can enjoy music and prayers and begin to learn valuable lessons, even from sermons aimed at adults. They do not get everything, but they can get something from observing the fervency and genuineness of the church's expression of love for God, dependence upon Him, and joy in Him. This is the value of having youth in church. Youth progressively understand what a parent and the wider church members love and appreciate. How can the church be a place that draws youth in, empowers their leadership, and provides them in the ways that they need? By letting them be the body of Christ by serving.


