From the Desk of Pastor Jonathan

Dear Fellow Pilgrims,

As we find ourselves in the midst of September, many of us are navigating the flurry of back-to-school preparations, adjusting to the renewed rhythm of work, and managing the countless routine tasks that populate our days. In this bustling atmosphere, it's essential to pause, breathe, and remind ourselves of the true source of rest amidst the whirlwind of life.

Jesus invites us with open arms, saying, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28). What a comforting assurance! But how do we respond to this call amidst our packed schedules and endless to-dos?

That is where having spiritual disciplines is important. Spiritual disciplines are not just a set of routine religious exercises; they are, in essence, the heartbeat of our relationship with God. They serve as pathways that lead us to the deep wells of spiritual refreshment, ensuring that amidst the clamor, our souls remain anchored in Christ.

This is not just about abstaining from work but about reveling in God's presence, reflecting on His goodness, and recharging for the week ahead.

Fourthly, Hebrews 10:25 reminds us, "And let us not neglect our meeting together, as some people do, but encourage one another, especially now that the day of his return is drawing near." Sharing life with fellow believers, be it in church, small groups, or casual meet-ups, is vital. Fellowship uplifts us, keeps us accountable, and strengthens our faith.

In conclusion, dear members, as the world around us accelerates, let us be intentional in carving out moments to sit at Jesus' feet, just as Mary did amidst her daily duties (Luke 10:42). By prioritizing and consistently practicing these spiritual disciplines, we ensure that our souls remain rested, refreshed, and ready to face the challenges and joys of our daily lives.

Wishing you God's grace as you settle in into your routine. May you find true rest in Him as you journey through this season.

Your Consistory has been hard at work to bring us back to the pre-pandemic status for St. Paul. We have come through the last few years with the pandemic, two interims and a drop in our membership. At the beginning of this year, we presented a deficit budget of \$43,493.00 to the Congregation at our Annual Meeting. We were still in an interim period, not knowing for sure when we would call a new settled pastor.

Things moved faster than we had anticipated and with much CELEBRATION, we called our new pastor in June. This brought on additional costs for relocation, remodeling and preparing the parsonage for our Pastor's family to call their home.

We are now just a little over half way thru 2023. We have increased our church attendance, have seen new faces and also people coming back that we haven't seen for a while. Pledges have exceeded the budget amount and fund raising has been wonderful. This has all helped to stabilize our ministry at St.

Paul and make us whole again.

With the deficit and additional expenses, the Consistory has been challenged in many ways. We have worked to fill staff positions and realign job descriptions. We are working to hold our expenses to the budget and have asked our committees to do the same. A successful rummage sale along with additional gifts to the "Fundraising' fund have allowed us to ask for a transfer of \$25,500.00 to cover part of the deficit. With these funds, we are still falling short of meeting our deficit and we have had to dip into our reserves.

HOW CAN YOU HELP? You can help by bringing your annual giving up to date. If you could take a moment and ponder whether you could make an additional gift before year end, this would be appreciated. We as a Consistory will continue to monitor our expenses. As of now, we have used a portion of our reserves to cover the shortage. Any additional support will help us replenish our reserves.

We are all being called to be good STEWARDS of the gifts God has given to us. As a Consistory we are charged with being good stewards of the gifts you give. As a steward of the church, you are asked to consider what your gifts to the church might be to carry out the ministry of the church. STEWARDSHIP IS BETWEEN YOU AND GOD. Only you can make the decision on your gift. TOGETHER, WE CAN ASSURE THE STRONG AND VIABLE MINISTRY OF ST. PAUL CONTINUES.

Prayers for Hawaili

On August 8, the people of Hawaii woke to high winds from Hurricane Dora blowing across their islands. Little did anyone know that within hours those winds would turn deadly, fanning wildfires among the islands, leaving behind smoldering buildings and lost lives. As I write to you, the death toll is up to 99 and still rising.

The United Church of Christ holds all who are affected in prayer. Through Wider Church Ministries, the UCC also has issued a special appeal to provide essential items and long-term support to those impacted by the fires.

The island of Maui was hardest hit, where the fires quickly consumed the historic city of Lahaina. Located in northwestern Maui, the once whaling center is home to 13,000 people and attracts 2 million tourists yearly. What is left now is more than 2,170 charred acres and the ruins of more than 2,200 homes, businesses, schools, and churches. If you have seen any of the news footage, you will agree with me that the destruction is unbelievable and heartbreaking.


