

Thresholds

As 2022 recedes behind us, we eagerly stand on the threshold of a New Year, in much the same way that year has followed year for centuries. The "procession" of new years began when in 1582 Pope Gregory the Thirteenth introduced the calendar we use to this day. His correction of the older Julian calendar was to add the leap year which provides a few folk with a strange birthdate, February 29.

I am, however, more interested in exploring thresholds than calendars. A threshold speaks of passage from one place to another. It is a doorway, an opening, a place of interface between past and future. The ancient Romans honored thresholds with the god Janus. He was the god of beginnings, gates, transitions, time, doorways, frames, and endings. He was depicted as having two faces, one to look in each direction from a doorway. It was said that Janus saw both past and future at the same time. We recognize Janus in the name January, the month that stands at the threshold of the new year, so full of possibilities and hope.

The power of the threshold is also recognized in the Jewish tradition of the *mezuzah*, which means "doorpost". The mezuzah is a piece of parchment contained in a decorative case that is attached to the right side of a doorway or gate. On the parchment is written verses from the best known Jewish prayer, *Shema Yisrael*, which includes the great commandment from Deuteronomy 6:4-9. Verse 5, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might". Verse 9 instructs the faithful to "write these words on the doorposts of your house and on your gates." The faithful believer touches the mezuzah every time they cross the threshold.

We in our western culture cross thresholds constantly as we come and go, from homes, offices, schools and shops. Most of our crossings are casual, perhaps even unconscious. We may pause to say, "It's good to get here", or "great to get away from there", but we lack a ritual sensibility about thresholds. Our comings and goings seem to be just that.

I have heard the poet, David Whyte, speak eloquently about thresholds. For him thresholds are not simply points of passage from one place to another, doors and gates that must be unlocked, opened, closed, in the service of progress. He notes that every moment is a threshold, and he invites us to become aware of what this might mean in our daily living. He asks us to become conscious of the Holy in every moment, wherever we are. Whyte reflects the truth that God abides here and now, in the present, not in some past memory, not in some future hope, but here on the very threshold where you stand. God is the doorway through which we live and move and have our being.

To be truly alive is to live with the awareness that we live in Christ, and that every moment is sacred and blessed with the "threshold sense" of existence. As we continue into the New Year, a church in transition, my prayer is that we can more fully embrace these interim months as ongoing reminders that this season may be even more spirit-filled that we have imagined. This time, a threshold between what was and what will be, is a holy season.

Blessings to you on the threshold of this new year, this new day, this very moment,



SOLAR PANEL UPDATE

St. Paul UCC had installed a solar panel system in January 2021. Production of our solar started January 20, 2021. This article, the first in a series, will help the congregation better understand our solar power system. I, like many had questions about the solar system installed at our church. Questions such as, how much solar energy does it produce? What energy savings do we achieve? What are all the benefits of a solar system? How is all of this tracked? Many other questions come to mind, I will attempt to answer some of these important questions in this and future articles. Solar Edge is the monitoring platform, website, and app the church can access. It makes use of single log-in which tracks production on an interactive dashboard. Solar energy, similar to electricity is factored using Kilowatt hours(kWh) and Megawatt hours (MWh). 1,000 Kilowatts = 1 Megawatt. January 20, 2021 – December 1, 2022 the solar panel system has produced 97.73 MWh (97,730 kWh). For more information, there is a chart available for print in the office.



(MATTHEW 4: 1-11)

How few of us know wilderness, here in these towns, sprawling cities, the gray of their streets, green shrunk down to dots of lawn, patches of park, the remnant trees silent in their memories of an earth mourning its lost forests as Rachel would mourn for her children.

Perhaps this is wilderness: this loss of wild nature, its replacement by concrete and asphalt and steel, its thinning rivers, its sickened oceans, its creatures dwindling like the leaves of a disease-stricken tree.

Perhaps this wilderness is where the Christ must come today: into this new human solitude, this place slowly being emptied of all life not our own, this place where even God becomes harder to find, our relationship to the divine put under hard pressure, our temptation to be ourselves the only god we will serve, tempted to pretend we are invulnerable.

O Holy One, come into this, our self-made wilderness.

Come be with us in the loneliness of our cell phones and computers, come be with us in our hunger for the meaning of our life, come into the wasteland we are making of the earth, this kingdom of our arrogance where we so often forget the life-giving love of God.

O Holy One, help us here, before this wilderness becomes one we do not know how to leave.
